



Building Bows and Bowhunters

A few weeks before the United Bowhunters of Missouri Festival in Jefferson City, I took the opportunity to speak with Darren Haverstick and Brian Peterson about having the UBM becoming more visible in Missouri this coming year in celebration of our 25 year anniversary. A perfect time to toot our own horn about reaching a milestone and a freshening of spirits to get folks out around the state doing something not only good for the UBM but archery as a whole. I let them know of an opportunity to be in front of thousands of deer hunters from around the state at the 2012 Missouri Deer Classic in Columbia and take that opportunity to come and build some kids PVC bows. The idea was well received and after a few emails and phone calls we got the details worked out and on the 1st Saturday of March, Darren and Brian came to Columbia and had even brough along Mike

and Tim Wirt from District 5. Those guys brought enough supplies to build bows for what looked like the better part of the week. They had a big box of PVC cut to length, bags of string materials, rolls of tape long enough to reach across the county and arm loads of tools, jigs and what-nots to make it all come together.

I myself was not able to offer any help with the bow building process due to obligations of running the event but every time I ventured by their booth, they had it under control. Yea, they on occasion had a look of panic in their eyes when they would look up from the task of building bows long enough to notice the line of kids waiting to have a bow built just for them but they kept on building. The sounds of palm sanders and rotary tools drew the attention of every patron of the show and the cloud of PVC dust directed folks on their way toward the UBM booth. Parents and well as the kids where in awe of those four fellas standing there all day to make sure kids that wanted a bow got one. Donations were made toward the cause even though they were never asked for and I'm sure if there would have been a pallet of arrows at the booth the UBM could have sold them hand over fist.

Before the end of the show the materials where gone and those four guys looked FLAT WORN OUT! The PVC dust sticking to their sweaty shirts and faces would have made for a great picture. Even though they were worn out, hungry and had a long drive that evening to get home, they were all smiles every time a bow was handed to another child. I was able to stop by

the booth as bow number 200 was handed off to another grateful child. I think if they would have had more hands and more materials, the number of kids with bows that day could have been even higher.

Brain, Darren, Mike and Tim . . . my hat is off to you and I applaud you for taking your Saturday and doing what you did to promote archery here in our great state. My hope for next year is to invite the UBM back with more space, more members and more materials and see if we can push that number closer to the 600 kids with bows in one weekend. I think the UBM can do it! Actually, I KNOW the UBM can do it. Thanks again guys!



The History of the Archery Big Bucks of Missouri

In July of 1981 Ken Perry, Lawrence Redel, Dwayne Allen, Ed Davidson, Paul Hilgedick and Ron West formed the club know as Archery Big Bucks of Missouri. Since then it has been the record-keeping organization for antlered-whitetail bowkills in Missouri. It was determined, that the purpose of the club is to recognize and honor exceptional whitetail deer antlers that have been taken by bow and arrow; provide assistance to individuals in registering trophy heads with the Pope and Young Club; encourage the use of the bow in hunting all legal game; cooperate with all recognized archery associations in securing local and statewide hunting privileges and conditions for bowhunters; and cooperate with all conservation organizations in the conservation of wildlife and the observance of game laws.

Since that time Archery Big Bucks of Missouri not only succeeded in accomplishing these goals, but far surpassed them. As a sponsor of the Missouri Deer Classic, ABBM has had the opportunity to promote bowhunting to a wide variety of Missourians and their families. It has allowed them to fund multiple bowhunting projects, such as the National Archery in Schools Program, Share the Harvest, Urban Bowhunting to the benefit of the bowhunters and residents of this state. In 2005 ABBM, along with Missouri Bow Hunters and United Bowhunters of Missouri formed the Missouri Bowhunting Council to protect the rights of bowhunters by presenting a united front when addressing bowhunting concerns. ABBM also represents the bowhunters of Missouri as members of the North American Bowhunting Coalition.

In recent years the average score of trophies submitted for entry has risen consistently. This is attributed to better management and new regulations, such as limited buck harvest and the 4-point rule instituted in 29 counties. As a result of these and other pending changes, ABBM reviewed their original requirements to determine how best to respond to the changes the state is experiencing. As a result of this review the entry requirements were changed to 115 0/8 typical and 135 0/8 non-typical. Another change prompted by this review was the elimination of point categories. As a result of this change, there will be no point category awards, however awards will continue to be given for the #1 and #2 typical and #1 and #2 non-typical in the recording period.

Dear UBM—



P.S. One gentlemen asked me during my seminar on deer, about what to do when they're hunting oak forests where the deer are bedding anywhere and not needing to travel great distances for feed. Those of you who are faced with this dilemma have your hands full, that's for sure. In your decision-making process, I would factor heavily into the equation the availability of water. I would also consider gentle, forced movement as part of your bag of tricks, and perhaps even rake out some areas for easier/quieter access, and possibly to even make for easier acorn retrieval for the deer. As the seasons progress, the downwind areas adjacent to known doe territories are also a place from his to start to fine-tune your stand location process. There are no easy answers on this one, but part of the reason I so love bowhunting deer is the recognition of the problems presented by any scenario, and then trying to find a way to solve the puzzle. I'm sure you agree. Thanks again!
